Module Aims	The primary goal of this module is to transition students from basic computer literacy to becoming technologically competent and security-aware users who understand advanced concepts like networking and modern IT challenges. Upon successful completion of this module, students will be able to: 1. Analyze and Secure Systems: Identify common network architectures, analyze security threats (malware, phishing), and apply foundational defensive measures like firewalls and strong authentication. 2. Conduct E-Commerce Safely: Differentiate between various electronic banking channels (online, mobile, ATM), verify transaction security protocols (HTTPS, 2FA), and engage in digital commerce with confidence. 3. Perform Technical Troubleshooting: Apply systematic methodologies to diagnose and resolve typical hardware and software errors, utilizing system utilities and data backup strategies. 4. Grasp AI Fundamentals: Define Artificial Intelligence (AI), differentiate between key concepts (ML, Deep Learning), and recognize the role of AI in modern applications like virtual assistants and translation services. 5. Evaluate Ethical and Societal Impact: Critically analyze the ethical challenges posed by AI, including issues of bias, privacy, and job displacement, fostering a responsible perspective on emerging technologies.
Module Learning Outcomes	Upon successful completion of this module, the student will be able to: 1. Differentiate Network Types: Distinguish between LAN, WAN, and MAN and explain the function of core network components (routers, switches) in each. 2. Apply Security Measures: Identify common cyber threats (phishing, malware) and articulate how a firewall and antivirus software contribute to system defense. 3. Perform Secure Access: Explain and demonstrate the rationale and steps for using Two-Factor Authentication (2FA) and secure password practices. 4. Verify Secure Transactions: Identify the HTTPS protocol and the SSL/TLS certificate in a web browser to verify the security of an online banking transaction. 5. Compare E-Banking Channels: Contrast the functionalities and security features of online banking, mobile banking, and ATM services, including the technology behind EMV chip cards. 6. Evaluate Digital Wallets: Explain the concept of Tokenization and its role in securing payments made via Digital Wallets (e.g., Apple Pay, Google Pay). 7. Systematically Diagnose Issues: Implement a systematic troubleshooting cycle to diagnose whether a problem is hardware or software related. 8. Utilize System Utilities: Use operating system tools (Task Manager, Activity Monitor, Disk Utility) to analyze system resource consumption (CPU, RAM) and optimize performance. 9. Implement Data Protection: Differentiate between backup types (e.g., full vs. incremental) and configure a basic system restore point or backup plan. 10. Define AI Concepts: Accurately define and distinguish between the fields of Artificial Intelligence, Machine Learning, and Deep Learning. 11. Identify Mobile AI Applications: Explain how Natural Language Processing (NLP) and Speech Recognition enable the functionality of Virtual Assistants (e.g., Siri, Alexa) and Real-Time Translation. 12. Analyze AI Applications: Provide examples of how AI is used for predictive modeling in diverse sectors such as healthcare, finance (fraud detection), and

	autonomous transportation. 13. Assess Ethical Implications: Critically evaluate the ethical implications of AI, specifically addressing issues of Algorithmic Bias, data privacy, and the societal impact of automation and job displacement.

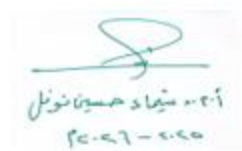

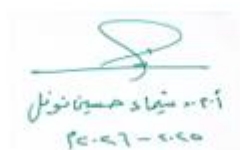

Distinguish among the terms used to identify the Respiratory System, Cardiovascular System, Skeletal System + Muscular System, Urinary System, Digestive System and Reproductive System.
Module Learning Outcomes	1. Break down complex medical terms into their component parts (prefixes, roots, suffixes). 2. Define or explain medical terms accurately 3. Apply medical terms in written and oral communication in a healthcare context. 4. Interpret medical documentation and literature. 5. The student can write a case study 6. The students will be able to identify different anatomical structure within human body. 7. The students will be able to identify different physical terms related to medical applications.
Indicative Contents	This course is elaborated within 15 weeks including a mid-exam. It commences with introductory lecture about the analyzing and building the medical terminology. The explanation is followed by some exercises to be implemented by the students and a quiz to evaluate the students' comprehension in this regard. In the later weeks, a concentration on the types, names and components of human body systems. The lecturer adjusts the students' pronunciation of the related terms, spelling and position within human body organs. The focus is on the most important divisions required while doing the proficient related to medical physics. The course ends with lectures handle terminology required in medical physics, especially in radiation. Finally, the weeks follow focus on different physical term used in medical applications of physics such as; Biological Effects of Radiation, Radiation Physics terms and dosimetry terms.
